







2021 Highlights

 Emergency Medical providers and 1 Personal Care medical provider.
- Public Safety outreach at Lifest.
- Public Safety Outreach BMX Racetrack.

Operating Highlights

- 2021 continued with answering the call when others are asked to stay out of the
 public to stop the spread of Covid 19. Diligently our group Vaccinated as they
 felt compelled to protect themselves from extended illness if the virus was
 contracted.
- The group was also vigilant about watching illness and self-isolating if they were ill or had contracted the virus. We continue to have self-testing kits available for our responders to rapidly diagnose covid 19.
- Advanced Personal Protective gear continued to be obtained from the State of Wisconsin Stockpile and we were able to minimize the cost to the taxpayers.
- We continue to utilize the highest level of care in the state of Wisconsin for first responders with advanced skill sets such as Epinephrine, spinal immobilization, advanced airways, Narcan, Blood glucose analysis. And Automated Defibrillators.
- We all carry a personal carbon monoxide detector to keep us aware of harmful atmosphere conditions.
 - We respond from our homes with our personal vehicles along with Gold Cross Ambulance.

- We will continue actively recruit and give training to the town residents in the care of STOP the bleed tourniquet usage and CPR training.
- When we bring on new members, we will look at the diversity of our locations in the town and what available times are for response.
- We will be vigilant and work with the areas Falls Prevention coalition to decrease falls.
- Working with our Regional EMS partners will collaborate on best care and Mutual aide procedures if needed.
- Continue to Fundraise and reach our Goal of AED Upgrades with donating our current units to Public AED Status in the Town.
- Provide First Responder Training to Town residents that would potentially like to join our Team as openings occur.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The Town OF Oshkosh EMS strives to be fiscally responsible with the generous donation as well as the Budget allowed from the taxpayers.

- 1. Operating Budget \$35,076.94
- Donations and Beneficiary of donations from estates. Current Account Balance to be used for EMS related activities equipment and outreach to the town of Oshkosh Residents.
- \$105,434.16 Current End of year November 2021.

General Expenses do include training and other items that expire most time before we can use them.

- Average Response from dispatch 1.75 minutes.
- Median time from dispatch to Scene is 8 minutes.
- 45 percent of our call the age is over 80 years old.
- 5 percent is pediatric.

The Planning and Zoning Commission met only once in the year 2021.

The meeting was an informational meeting by Tim Moore whom wants to purchase three parcels which total 62 acres. His plan for these parcels is for cross country running events. He would have 15-20 events in the fall.

He also would like to build a home and an open sided enclosed shelter and a garage for equipment to maintain the trails.

The Town of Oshkosh would have to change the Comprehensive Plan as the area on the Comprehensive Plan is general farming. The Town of Oshkosh would have to have a public hearing to change these parcels to Institutional and Recreation Park.

Our motion was to pursue a public hearing to change the Town of Oshkosh Comprehensive Plan.
